## About the Center

UChicago Center in Beijing advances the University of Chicago's strategic priorities in China, creates opportunities for impactful partnership and help mitigate country specific risks.

#### Mission

The University of Chicago Center in Beijing provides a physical presence to enhance and strengthen the University of Chicago's traditionally strong ties to Chinese thought and culture. Building upon more than a century of collaboration between scholars from Chicago and China, the Center in Beijing enables the University to expand existing initiatives and form new alliances and partnerships with universities, businesses, medical centers, policy groups, government agencies, and cultural organizations across China.

The Center serves as a base for University of Chicago faculty, graduate students, and undergraduates engaging with China. It also provides a gathering space for alumni throughout Asia and acts as a resource for Chinese researchers and students.

Focusing on three core areas where University of Chicago scholarship and the concerns of contemporary China intersect—business, economics, and policy; science, medicine, and public health; culture, society, and the arts—the Center capitalizes on a substantial body of work already underway, including faculty research and programs for students. The Center also houses the University's Civilization Abroad program for undergraduate students and supports research and study at all levels from each of the University's divisions and schools and the College.

#### History

The University of Chicago's rich history of scholarly collaboration in China dates back to the early 1900s. In the span of a century, research partnerships between University of Chicago scholars and their Chinese counterparts have blossomed into dozens of ongoing relationships spanning many fields of study. The Center in Beijing builds on the University's legacy of engagement, providing an intellectual destination for research, teaching, and scholarly partnerships.

#### **Business, Economics, and Policy**

Chicago economics has had significant influence in China. In 1980, D. Gale Johnson, an expert on agricultural policy and development economics, led a group of U.S. economists, including Nobel laureate Theodore W. Schultz, to Beijing, where they delivered China's first course in modern economics. The center provides a major platform for generating new dialogue between Chicago scholars and Chinese policymakers, scholars, and business leaders on topics such as human capital and economic development, trade and foreign exchange policy, environmental regulation and health policy, and effective business practices

#### **Culture, Society, and the Arts**

Since the 1930s, when Herrlee G. Creel, PHB '26, PhD '29, one of the world's foremost scholars on China's early civilization and an authority on Confucius, helped found the University of Chicago's program in Far Eastern Studies, the University has been an important center for the study of Chinese language and civilization. Through international conferences, visiting positions, master seminars for faculty, and interactions with academic institutions, the Center enables more Chicago scholars and students to engage in collaborations with China.

#### Science, Medicine, and Public Health

Since 1914, when University of Chicago President Harry Pratt Judson led the commission that helped establish the China Medical Board and Peking Union Medical College, the University has been home to many Chinese scientists who have made critical contributions to their fields, including Nobel laureates C.N. Yang, PhD '48, and T.D. Lee, PhD '50 (Physics, 1957) and Daniel Tsui, SM '63, PhD '67 (Physics, 1998). The center provides a physical base for University of Chicago scientists and their Chinese colleagues to expand already substantial partnerships.



#### **Facility & Location**

Located in the Haidian District of Beijing, known for its rich intellectual ecology of top universities, research academies, and government agencies, the Center provides space for seminars and conferences, as well as faculty offices and study areas. Easily accessed by car or public transportation, the Center is a welcoming environment of fluidity and exchange that brings together diverse perspectives and experiences.

The University of Chicago Center in Beijing has more than 2,000 square meters of space, featuring offices for University of Chicago faculty-in-residence and staff, as well as a variety of classrooms and conference facilities. Center staff are available to facilitate the work of faculty and students.

#### **Programs Hosted**

#### **Study Abroad**

The Center in Beijing is home to the Beijing: East Asia, Then and Now Program (formerly known as the East Asian Civilizations Program), which resumed in September 2024 after a four-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This sequence is taught in English by University of Chicago professors, its emphasis shifting from year to year in accordance with the interests and expertise of that year's faculty. While China, in keeping with the location of the program, will hold a central position in the sequence, some professors may choose to focus on other Asian countries such as Korea or Japan.

In addition to the civilization sequence, students take a fourth course in Chinese language, offered at various levels, designed to facilitate their access to the local culture. Beijing itself, the fabled "Northern Capital" of the Ming Dynasty and now the political and cultural capital of modern China, plays a key role in this program. A series of excursions and site visits helps connect classroom learning with the physical reality, past and present of China.

#### **Building Academic Collaborations**

#### Body and Empiricism Workshop

The "Body and Empiricism Workshop" co-hosted by the Peking University School of Health Humanities and the University of Chicago Center in Beijing in 2024, was held from June 27th to June 28th at Peking University School of Health Humanities and from July 1st to July 2nd at the University of Chicago Center in Beijing. The workshop is based on the framework of science and technology studies to explore and discuss the body, empiricism, and perception through the approach of anthropology, phenomenology, and history.

At the University of Chicago Center in Beijing, Professor Judith Farquhar led the second part of the workshop through exploring the concepts of the body and empiricism. Prof. Judith Farquhar specializes in research on traditional medicine, popular culture, and everyday life in contemporary China. Professor Lili Lai delivered a lecture on the second morning on the historical entanglement of Chinese medicine and cybernetics, to illustrate the interesting affinity of Chinese medicine body and posthuman body.

## 10<sup>th</sup> Joint Conference of the University of Chicago and PUMCH Liver Surgery

On September 6th and 7th, The University of Chicago Center in Beijing, in partnership with Peking Union Medical College Hospital (PUMCH) and AME Publishing, successfully hosted the 10th Joint Conference of the University of Chicago and PUMCH Liver Surgery funded by Provost's Global Faculty Awards. The conference was established in the inaugural year of the Center in Beijing and has been hosted consecutively over the past decade, interrupted only once by the pandemic. This year's conference focused on Minimally Invasive Surgery and Adjuvant Therapy for Hepatobiliary and Pancreatic Diseases, attracting over 80 in-person and more than 14, 000 online attendees.

#### The 4th UChicago Medicine China Forum

The 4th UChicago Medicine China Forum, featuring the John E. Ultmann Distinguished Service Professor Everett Vokes, held at the Center Oct. 29th. 60 participants from our partner institutions, medical students and alumni, families had the opportunity to learn the latest of cancer treatments and important progress made at the UChicago Medicine. Prior to the conference, Dr. Vokes met with journalists from local media.

## Sino-U.S. Educational Dialogue and Academic Exchange: Challenges and Prospects

More than 20 representatives from international exchange and cooperation departments of various universities and hospitals participated in the closed-door meeting, where they engaged in detailed conversations and exchanged ideas on the future of Sino-U.S. academic collaboration.

Professor Dali Yang, the William Claude Reavis Distinguished Service Professor in the Department of Political Science at the University of Chicago, and Professor Zhang Ying, Bo-Ya Professor at Peking University and Associate Dean at Peking University's Guanghua School of Management, who also serves as the Academic Director of Peking University Center in Chicago, headlined the discussions. Both speakers provided deep insights into the evolving dynamics of Sino-U.S. educational collaboration and addressed the potential challenges in future. They also highlighted the importance of fostering robust academic exchanges amidst global uncertainties.

## What is Jewish Philosophy? A View from the Middle Ages

On December 18, more than 30 participants gathered at the University of Chicago Center in Beijing for an insightful lecture titled "What is Jewish Philosophy? A View from the Middle Ages" by Josef Stern, William H. Colvin Professor of Philosophy Emeritus at the University of Chicago.Stern's lecture explored whether a distinctive Jewish philosophy exists. Drawing on medieval Jewish philosophy, he argued that it cannot be defined solely by the identity or religious context of its philosophers. Instead, he suggested viewing it as a philosophical 'tradition', a causally related sequence of philosophers who influence and are influenced by each other and engaged in a distinguishable dialogue among themselves.

## The Ideal of the Sage in Jewish and Chinese Thought and Culture

From December 15 to 18, eight scholars from the University of Chicago and Israel gathered at Shandong University's Jinan campus for the symposium titled "The Ideal of the Sage in Jewish and Chinese Thought and Culture". This event, co-hosted by the Center for Judaic and Inter-Religious Studies at Shandong University, the Joyce Z. and Jacob Greenberg Center for Jewish Studies of the University of Chicago, and coordinated by the Center in Beijing, delved into the voluminous texts of classic literature, including the Hebrew Bible, Rabbinic literature, and traditional Chinese literary works.

## Human Doors, Ghost Doors: Entrances and Exits in Qing Court Theater

On December 6th, the University of Chicago Center in Beijing hosted a captivating lecture titled "Human Doors, Ghost Doors: Entrances and Exits in Qing Court Theater" with an attendance of more than 40 people. The lecture explored how the Qing court reconstructed stage space to navigate the lengthy scripts while presenting the opera in unprecedented detail.

The lecture was delivered by Judith Zeitlin, the William R. Kenan Jr. Professor of East Asian Languages and Civilizations at the University of Chicago. Her research combines the history of Chinese literature in Ming and Qing dynasties with other disciplines such as visual and material culture, performance, music, medicine, gender studies, and modern media. In this lecture, Professor Zeitlin focused on the critical role of entrances and exits in shaping stage space in traditional Chinese opera. She revealed how the Qing court, particularly during the reign of Emperor Qianlong, redefined the use of stage entrances, significantly altering the spatial dynamics of court performances.

#### Space and Event: An Art History Workshop

On March 10, numerous scholars, students, and art enthusiasts gathered at the Center in Beijing for a day-long art history workshop, which features in-depth discussions on the dynamic relationships between space, time, and image-making in various historical contexts, brought together more than 100 attendees.

#### Articulating the Queer Self: Self-reflexive Knowledge Production with Queer-identifying College Students in Beijing

Since September 2024, the Center in Beijing has been supporting a participatory action research (PAR) project led by Yueran Zhang, an Assistant Professor of Sociology and the College. This project seeks to understand how queer-identifying college students in Beijing develop and transform their understanding of the self and the society over time. By treating research participants as collaborators rather than mere subjects, this project aims to generate self-reflexive knowledge that could concretely lead to a sense of empowerment among communities of queer youth in challenging times. As part of the research project, participants meet regularly for community-building events, facilitated discussion, film screenings and conversations with queer activists. The Beijing Center has consistently provided meeting space and logistics support for the gatherings.

## 2025 Wanxiang Fellows Engage with Green Energy Leaders in Beijing

As part of their immersive 5-week fellowship in China, the 2025 cohort of 30 Wanxiang Ambassador Fellows convened in Beijing for the annual Wanxiang Ambassador Fellows Green Energy Conference. The program, established under the U.S. State Department's 100,000 Strong Initiative, aims to build lasting relationships between future leaders from the United States and China through a shared focus on renewable energy, language, and culture.

The cornerstone conference, held from June 23rd to June 25th at the University of Chicago Center in Beijing, featured a distinguished panel of eight speakers from leading research universities, institutes, and major corporations at the forefront of the green energy industry.

This three-day event offered the fellows an unparalleled opportunity to engage with top academics and industry experts. Through a series of lectures and in-depth discussions, the students gained valuable insights into critical topics such as China's environmental regulations, policies on carbon neutrality, the development of photovoltaic power, renewable energy integration, and the future of hydrogen, wind, and New Energy Vehicles (NEVs).

## Workshop: Amateur Culture, Platform Economy, Precarious Life

From June 25 to 27, fifty scholars, writers and researchers gathered at the Center in Beijing for a workshop titled "Amateur Culture, Platform Economy, Precarious Life", which discussed the opportunities and challenges brought by the rise of the platform economy, particularly focusing on the contemporary working-class condition and related cultural production under the platform economy.

The event was hosted by Paola Iovene, Associate Professor at the Department of EALC at the University of Chicago, Chun Chun (Isha) Ting, an independent scholar, and Zhang Huiyu, Associate Professor at the School of Journalism and Communication at Peking University. Key themes included the gig economy's erosion of worker dignity, the role of self-media in amplifying marginalized voices and evolving patronage systems like virtual gifting. The program featured roundtables and presentations on topics ranging from reproductive labor to Al's influence on cultural production.

#### New Directions In Longmen Grottoes Art Research



They explored the diverse and rich connotations of these works, offering a more comprehensive and layered world of Chinese painting.


#### University of Chicago Laboratory Schools Students Visit China

Twenty University of Chicago Laboratory Schools students embarked on a two-week exploration trip to China in March. The students spent a week visiting rural areas in Sichuan Province before continuing their journey to Beijing. On March 19, the group visited the Center in Beijing, where Executive Director Dr. Zening Ge introduced them to China's higher education system and engaged in a Q&A session.

During their stay in Beijing, students participated in classroom exchanges with peers from the High School Affiliated with Renmin University of China and Beijing Dandelion School, a nonprofit middle school providing equal access to quality education for children in Beijing from low-income migrant families.

#### Strengthening Collaboration Between UChicago Medicine and China

In April 2025, two delegations from UChicago Medicine—comprising faculty, a resident, and a medical student—participated in multi-disciplinary academic engagements in Beijing and Wuhan. These visits, organized by the WUMER Project and supported by the Center in Beijing, advanced collaborative efforts in emergency medicine, geriatrics and palliative care, continuing medical education, and clinical training. Outcomes included plans for future exchanges, collaborative research, and leadership in expanding the ECHO education model across China.

#### Advancing Emergency Medicine Collaboration

**Beijing:** On April 12, Drs. David Beiser, Nicolas Ludmer, and Jonathan Lio, participated in the 18th Peking Union Internal Symposium on Emergency Medicine (PUISEM), with Dr. Beiser delivering a keynote to 2,000 attendees on strategies to improve cardiac arrest outcomes in Chicago and Dr. Ludmer presenting on emergency management of sepsis. University of Chicago faculty participated as part of an ongoing educational partnership. Following the symposium, the delegation visited the Emergency Medicine Department at Peking Union Medical College Hospital, hosted by IMEP alumnus Dr. Di Shi. Both sides expressed strong mutual interest in developing emergency medicine resident exchanges and building the trauma service at PUMCH. Plans are underway for a fall 2025 visit by EM faculty from PUMCH to the University of Chicago to study EM and trauma integration in clinical care, quality improvement, and education.

**Wuhan:** From April 13–18, Drs. Beiser and Ludmer co-led a small-group teaching demonstration on cardiac cycle physiology at Wuhan University's Taikang School of Basic Sciences, in collaboration with Dr. Peng Biwen. The session attracted students and faculty observers from across the basic and clinical sciences. They also co-organized and participated in the Luojia Emergency Medical Clinical Research Academic Seminar at Zhongnan Hospital alongside colleagues from Wuhan and Beijing, and journal editors from the European Journal of Emergency Medicine, World Journal of Emergency Medicine, European Journal of Heart Failure, and Emergency and Critical Care Medicine. Discussions focused on data quality, randomized controlled trials, and research innovation. Strong interest was expressed by the Wuhan emergency medicine group in learning from Chicago's approaches to improving cardiac arrest outcomes, and both sides expressed interest in establishing a collaborative initiative in this area.

#### **Expanding Geriatrics and Palliative Care Education**

**Beijing:** On April 21, Drs. Shellie Williams and Jonathan Lio visited the Geriatrics Department at Peking Union Medical College Hospital. Dr. Williams led an interactive communication skills workshop for 60 participants from geriatrics and palliative care, with robust discussion on cultural differences in how bad news is communicated. The visit also served as a springboard for joint research initiatives on sarcopenia and frailty, and for future faculty exchanges.

**Wuhan:** From April 23–25, Dr. Williams delivered three presentations at Zhongnan and Renmin Hospitals: one on serious illness communication, one on the 4Ms framework (What Matters, Medication, Mentation, and Mobility) for age-friendly care, and one providing an overview of geriatrics and palliative medicine's clinical, educational, and research initiatives at the University of Chicago. Dr. Williams shared practical community educational resources for palliative care, which faculty from the school of nursing will adapt to their local context. Dr. Williams also joined a home visit with a local palliative care team and was consulted on cancer symptom management, strengtheningclinical trust and cross-cultural engagement.

#### Positioning Wuhan as China's Next ECHO Hub

The ECHO (Expanding Community Health Outcomes) team from the University of Chicago—Dr. Daniel Johnson, Karen Lee, and Kanika Mittal—introduced the model to faculty and staff at Zhongnan and Renmin Hospitals, and affiliated community health centers. ECHO is an innovative tele-mentoring model that leverages virtual, case-based learning to build capacity in underserved areas by connecting specialists with frontline healthcare providers. Wuhan University School of Medicine expressed strong interest in becoming China's second ECHO hub after Shanghai. The Department of General Practice was especially motivated to launch the first educational series to pilot the model with local community health centers.

## Millis PGFA-International Experience in Global Health: Beijing

The Center, through support from the Provost Gloval Faculty Awards and China Medical Board, facilitated invaluable clinical shadowing opportunities for early resident medical students at Peking Union Medical College Hospital (PUMCH), China's premier research hospital. These rotations provided students with profound insights into global healthcare systems, medical education, and cultural nuances in patient care. Students gained exposure to a diverse range of cases, from rare diseases to advanced critical care technologies like Electrical Impedance Tomography (EIT), which one student noted was "very useful objective output that I had not encountered in ICU practice before." The program fostered deep cultural immersion, with one participant reflecting on the "priceless" benefit to their "cultural immersion and language abilities," while others appreciated the opportunity to "form genuine friendships" with their Chinese counterparts and explore historical sites. These experiences significantly broadened students' understanding of medical practice and education in a global context, reinforcing the Center's commitment to fostering international collaboration and enriching medical training.

#### **Developing Strategic Relationships**

Over the past year, the Center continued to develop and manage robust partner relations with its existing collaborators. Furthermore, we expanded our partner list to include several new and rapidly growing institutions, such as Shanghai Tech and Westlake University. Through strategic leadership visits, student exchanges, and collaborative faculty initiatives, the Center has successfully built strong and healthy relationships with China's top educational and governmental agencies, reinforcing our commitment to fostering international collaboration and enriching medical training.





It provides an invaluable opportunity for our faculty and students

to engage with a new generation of talent from an institution that is actively reshaping the future of higher education and scientific innovation in China.

The formalization of this partnership was a significant milestone. In June 2024, our Associate Vice President of Global Initiatives, Katie Hrinyak, visited Westlake University in Hangzhou. Her visit underscored the University of Chicago's commitment to this collaboration and laid the groundwork for future, deeper connections between our two institutions. The productive dialogues and shared vision established during this visit promise to enrich the experiences of students and faculty on both sides of the Pacific.

This partnership is more than a simple academic exchange; it is a forward-looking engagement with a bold, new model of higher education. By working with Westlake University, the University of Chicago is not only expanding its global footprint but also contributing to the development of a more diverse and interconnected academic ecosystem, fostering the next generation of global leaders and innovators.
